

Gail Laughton

In Memoriam Gail Laughton 1921-1985

Gail Laughton was one of the first—and the finest pioneers in the fields of jazz and "swing" harp. Originally from Oklahoma, Laughton was touring Panama and Cuba with his family's orchestra by 1920. His first all-jazz harp record was released by RCA Victor in 1942.

Laughton moved to California in the 1940s and his outstanding level of harp playing quickly made him successful in the motion picture recording industry. He worked with Harpo Marx, Cary Grant and numerous other Hollywood celebrities. Two of Laughton's recordings are still available: Volume 5 of an Anthology of Paul Hindemith, with Laughton performing the Hindemith Sonata, and Harps of the Ancient Temples, a suite of eleven of his own compositions.

Laughton's special gifts in composition, performance, and his outstanding grasp of jazz on the harp will be greatly missed, but not forgotten, by the harp world.

COMPETITION PROCEDURES

Close applicants will perform for a panel of nationally recognized adjudicators. Harp finalists are urged to participate in person in an audition held in the School of Music at the University of Oregon February 27 and 28, however, those entrants who reside more than 150 miles from the campus may be judged by submitting a tape. For those entrants who cannot apply in time for the Eugene auditions a second competition will be held in Seattle, Washington on March 14 with an application deadline of February 16.
